Thank you for celebrating with us.



HISTORY

Born into poverty in Germany, Clara Zetkin was an advocate for women's rights, worker's rights, equal opportunity and suffrage. In 1910, Clara was the leader of the German Social Democratic Party's Women's Office.

At the Second International Conference of Working Women, Clara Zetkin proposed that an International Women's Day be held. Over 100 women from 17 countries voted in unanimous support.

1911

The first International Women's Day was held on 19 March 1911.
Across Europe, millions joined meetings and protests. One street demonstration saw 30,000 women march.

International Women's Day was moved to its current date of 8 March.

1913

1928

Australia's first International Women's Day march was held in Sydney. Organisers called for equal pay for equal work, an 8 hour working day and paid leave.

The United Nations adopts 8 March as International Women's Day.

Catherine is a volunteer, singer, and a person who is committed to kindness in everything she does.

Filiz Shah, City of Canning

Filiz uses her own lived experience and elevates the lived experiences of others to foster community cohesion. She is passionate about improving the present and future for all, particularly women and those from a multicultural background. Filiz has founded several organisations and projects, including Women of World Stage (WOWS), Voice of Work Ensemble, Multicultural Mini Movers and Our Stories Our Songs.

Hall and Prior - Jesusa Silverio, Natasha Bamber, Wendy Ashwin and Mina Pindolia

Reach Her - Maryann Tsai, Como

Maryann used her lived experience to found Reach Her. The organisation empowers women from diverse backgrounds to gain entry into employment, education and training. Through community organising and her "heart of gold", Maryann supports women's confidence, well-being and health. She has a "ripple effect" of empowerment and leadership that creates a self-sustaining network across the community and between generations.

Sobia Shah, Victoria Park

Sobia founded Professional Migrant Women's Network (PMWN) to provide equal work opportunities for professional women from culturally and linguistically diverse, refugee, asylum-seeking and/or marginalised backgrounds. She demonstrates dedication, compassion and leadership. As a Muslim woman, her journey serves as a beacon of hope, demonstrating that despite significant obstacles, positive change is achievable.

The REED Collective - Kristen Soon, City of Canning

Kristen Soon founded The REED Collective to create a community space where women from different backgrounds can feel seen, heard and valued. Through partnerships and community organising, Kristen has created connections between 200+ women from a variety of cultural and linguistic backgrounds. Together, they have built cross-cultural understanding, enhanced solidary, practiced creativity and enriched the fabric of the Swan community.

Amber Douglas, Lathlain

Amber is a role model in the Swan community as her unwavering commitment to her position in science and the government health department kept us all safe during uncertain times, and continues to do so in her position with the health department. Amber is an amazing scientist in a predominantly male field.

Dr Parwinder Kaur, Queens Park

As a proud Indian-Australian, Dr. Kaur has not only excelled in her field but has also made amazing contributions to the community. Through initiatives such as DNA Zoo Australia, Dr. Kaur leverages STEM to address pressing societal issues, encouraging fresh thinking and innovative solutions.

Claire Anderson, Victoria Park

Claire authored a book about her journey to motherhood - this is how she and her nominator first met. Claire uses her lived experience of severe illness in her work with the Disabilities Commission, Council of Victoria Park and life coaching. Her nominator described Claire as hard-working, dedicated and "an obvious inspiration and role-model for able bodied and disabled women."

Fiona Van Heerwaarden, St James

Fiona believes sport is for everyone and should be accessible for all. Her dedication, enthusiasm and work ethic has increased the number of locals involved in sport at all levels. Fiona is involved as a coach, official and administrator with the Carlisle-Rivervale Little Athletics Club, Belmont Little Athletics Centre, Athletics West, Table Tennis Association of WA and local hockey. She is a champion for race walking, hockey and table tennis.

Julie Clarke, Cannington/Midland

Julie Clarke manages hundreds of pieces of crucial forensic evidence with rigorous processes and exceptional attention to detail. Her effectiveness enables her colleagues to devote more time to community outreach, crime prevention and investigations. Working in a majority male workplace, Julie displays strength of character and sound values, and never hesitates to ensure Officers abide by correct evidentiary procedures.

Kim Maher, Bullsbrook

Kim's nomination comes from her husband of 27 years who "believes she should be recognised for her supreme efforts apart from me saying thank you." Living together on 10 acres of bushland, Kim is her husband's carer, looks after their animals and maintains their home and land. Kim ensures that her husband can maintain his connections to Culture, Country and Ancestors. Kim loves life and the people in it – she gives her all to help others achieve their hopes and dreams.

Mandy Mountfort, Bassendean

For decades, Mandy has gone above and beyond to lift up those around her and ensure no-one gets left behind. She is a long-term foster carer, provides respite to people with disabilities in her own home and mentors the next generation of foster carers, disability support workers and community workers. In an entirely voluntary capacity outside of her other commitments, Mandy established and ran "lifelines" like the Ellenbrook Support Network and Plenty Project Vending Machine.

Maryann Tsai, Como

Maryann used her lived experience to found Reach Her. The organisation empowers women from diverse backgrounds to gain entry into employment, education and training. Through community organising and her "heart of gold", Maryann supports women's confidence, well-being and health. She has a "ripple effect" of empowerment and leadership that creates a self-sustaining network across the community and between generations.

Ronhhda Potter, Lathlain

Zaneta Mascarenhas was born in Kalgoorlie to Goan Indian parents. Her father, Joe, was a fitter, and her mother, Ethel, a cleaner and lollypop lady.

When Joe and Ethel first attempted to start their skilled migrant visa, they were told "You have the right skills, but you're the wrong colour." The dismantling of the White Australia Policy enabled the family to finally start their better future in Australia.

Zaneta grew up in Kambalda with her sister, Cleta. She then moved to Swan aged 18 to study chemistry and engineering at Curtin University. Whilst completing her studies, Zaneta held leadership positions in the Curtin Student Guild and National Union of Students. After graduating, Zaneta worked as an engineer on mine and construction sites across regional WA and Victoria. The technical, interpersonal and policy skills she developed culminated in an engineering consultant role assisting ASX200 companies to decarbonise.

In 2022, Zaneta was elected as the federal Member for Swan. She is the first woman in the seat's 101-year history to hold this role.

Zaneta continues to live in Swan with her husband, Sam. They are raising their two young children, Lincoln and Felicity.

In the early days of Jacaranda, Lyndsay and her husband personally paid for the organisation's rent and operating costs.

Today, Jacaranda is a vibrant not-for-profit community hub with 16 employees, countless volunteers and a variety of social assistance and development programs.

Lyndsay and the Jacaranda team have won numerous awards for their holistic work supporting and building capacity of people on low incomes in the Belmont region.

As a Member of the National Coordination Group, Lyndsay provides evidence-based advice to the Minister for Social Services on demand, emerging issues and delivery of emergency relief, food relief and financial counselling services.

Freda Ogilvie is a Whadjuk/Ballardong Elder, retired teacher, board member and consultant with extensive experience in community and policy development.

For over three decades, she has promoted Indigenous rights and social justice, education, diversity and the empowerment of Indigenous communities whilst challenging prevailing stereotypes and prejudices.

Freda has educated students across WA as a teacher and deputy principal. She has been involved in the development and practice of strategies and programs for students from diverse linguistic, cultural, religious and socioeconomic backgrounds.

As a volunteer with Soroptimist International, Freda initiated an education scholarship in Broome, co-established the Aboriginal Nunga Woman's Group and assisted in developing a mobile preschool for geographically remote Aboriginal communities.

Freda continues to challenge Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people to commence tertiary studies in education, and mentors them throughout their studies.

Freda contributed to Aboriginal early childhood programs in WA and NT, early childhood education and care policy, oral language development programs and national early childhood education forums.

Following her retirement from Ruah's Board, Freda was appointed to the Future of Fremantle Committee through the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage.

Colleen Hayward is a senior Noongar woman with extensive family links throughout the south-west of WA. She comes from a teaching family with her father having been the first Aboriginal teacher, and Principal, in WA.

For more than 35 years, Colleen has provided significant input to policies and programs on a wide range of issues, reflecting the needs of minority groups at community, state and national levels. She has an extensive background in a range of areas including health, education, training, employment, housing, child protection, family and domestic violence, and law and justice as well as significant experience in policy and management.

Among her many achievements, she has been recognised for her long-standing work for and on behalf of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities across Australia by winning the 2008 National NAIDOC Aboriginal Person of the Year

Award. Colleen is also a recipient (2006) of the Premier of WA's prestigious Multicultural Ambassador's Award for advancing human rights and anti-racism in the community and is the 2009 inductee into the WA Department of Education's Hall of Fame for Achievement in Aboriginal Education.

In 2012, Colleen was inducted into the WA Women's Hall of Fame and was recognised as a Member in the General Division of the Order of Australia.

In 2015, Colleen was a finalist in the Australian of the Year (WA) Awards and was awarded one of Murdoch University's Distinguished Alumni for her work in the areas of Equity and Social Justice and Leadership WA's Honourable Fellow Award. She was named as one of WA's 100 most influential West Australians in both 2015 and 2016.

Although now retired from her position as Pro-Vice-Chancellor of Equity & Indigenous issues at Edith Cowan University, Colleen remains active and involved through her membership of a range of boards and advisory committees. She is also one of the co-leaders of Danjoo Koorliny, an Aboriginal-led initiative working towards the respectful inclusion of Aboriginal people in WA's 2029 bicentenary.

Since her election in 2021, Hannah was appointed Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministers for Emergency Services, Innovation and the Digital Economy, Volunteering, Lands, Housing and Homelessness.

Hannah is currently the Minister for Youth; Local Government and Minister Assisting the Minister for Training and Workforce Development.

She continues to call the electorate home, and is raising her two young sons.

Taken with pick No.3 in the 2020 draft, Bella Lewis is a tough, quick and strong midfielder who has established herself as one of the most anticipated young midfielders in the entire competition.

The 20-year-old is already a key contributor in the Eagles' engine room and has built on her performances each season she's played.

In season seven Bella had a career year averaging 21.5 disposals, 5.5 clearances and 325.9 metres gained per match.

Alongside her rise on the park, Bella has also arisen as a key figurehead and leader off the field within the entire Eagles' organisation ultimately earning her season seven's Trademark Player award in 2022.

In 2021, the Claremont Tigers product made Eagles club history by being awarded the Club Champion and Best First Year Player in the same season making her one of the most decorated AFLW players at West Coast with only three seasons under her belt.

In that same year, Bella was an AFL Women's Rising Star nominee.
